AYP Frequently Asked Questions

What is AYP?

Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) measures the yearly progress of schools throughout the United States. AYP is a part of the No Child Left Behind law that is designed to have all students at or above grade level proficiency in reading and math by the end of the 2013- 2014 school year.

How Does a School Make AYP?

A school makes AYP when each of the eligible student target groups is met. The target groups consist of: 1) School as a Whole; 2) White; 3) Black; 4) Hispanic; 5) Native American; 6) Asian; 7) Multiracial; 8) Economically Disadvantaged Students; 9) Limited English Proficient students; and 10) Students with Disabilities. In order for a school to have a target student group, there must be at least 40 students across the tested grades. The students are only included in the target group if they have been enrolled in the school for 140 or more days during the school year. For students that are part of a group with fewer than 40 students, the students will be counted only in the School as a Whole group. Students can be counted in multiple target groups.

How Does a School System (LEA) Make AYP?

A school system makes AYP when each of the eligible student target groups is met for the school system. All of the student scores in a school system are combined in each subgroup. Subgroups can be met at individual schools and not met as a school system.

What State Tests are Used to Determine AYP?

Participation and proficiency in reading and math end-of-grade tests for grades 3 – 8 make the determination for elementary and middle schools. Algebra I and a combination of English I and the Grade 10 Writing Assessments determine AYP for the high schools. Alternate Assessments are used for a small number of students.

How did Hickory Public Schools do for the 2008 – 2009 school year?

Hickory Public Schools increased the percentage of schools making AYP this school year. During the 2007 – 2008 school year, 4 of 10 schools met AYP. For the 2008 – 2009 school year, 7 out of 10 schools met AYP. The AYP Summary above includes the information for each school.
